Principal's Report

Each week seems to disappear more quickly than the one before it. The week that was included a continued focus on core literacy and numeracy skills, Student Support Group meetings and a trip to Melbourne Museum and IMAX for our Grade 3— 6 students.

The hours spent planning usually exceed the hours students actually spend on the excursion itself and this one was no exception. My thanks go to Kristy Balic for leading the organisation of the excursion and all staff who supported in the lead up and on the day. One of our Grade 3 students excitedly exclaimed, "There are six school days in a row when I'll be going on a bus!" He was referring to the excursion being followed by five days of swimming. Another big week is on the horizon!

Whilst Grade 3—6 students spent the day in Melbourne, our Foundation—Grade 2 students were the 'big kids' of the school. It was officially declared 'The best day ever!' by multiple students as they spent time on the senior playground and rode bikes at both breaks (we usually have juniors on bikes at one break and seniors on bikes in the other break).

With School and House Captains in Melbourne, the baton was passed to our Grade 1/2 students to lead assembly. They did a wonderful job—meeting ahead of assembly to count the values cards, practise reading the certificates and organising which person would lead each part of assembly. They spoke confidently and there was an offer to lead assembly again!

A highlight of every day is seeing students use their initiative to solve problems and lead positive change. A big thank you to Grade 1/2 students who decided to check the yard for rubbish and pick up any rogue pieces.

At this week's staff meeting, we spent time exploring the Past Present Future conversation prompt from Real Schools along with the Consistent Conversation Compass. These prompts provide an easy and effective way to navigate conversations through a restorative approach and guide the conversations we have with students. School Wide Positive Behaviour Support

Our expected behaviours matrix is displayed in all learning areas and the main office. Our values cards are earned by students when they demonstrate expected behaviours. Student leaders collect and count the values cards each week at their leadership meeting and have suggested a weekly lucky dip; all values cards earned in the week are placed in a tub and two winners randomly drawn out at assembly, earning themselves a 'values voucher'.





Foundation students demonstrated 'we share' and 'we wait our turn' by taking turns to use the sandpit tools along with modelling 'we are inclusive' by making sure everyone could participate.

Preparing for 2026

Classroom Placement Requests

Class lists for 2026 will soon start to be drafted. The process is complex with one underlying key focus—what will work best for students. When creating classes, multiple factors are taken into consideration, including friendships, academic abilities, behaviour and additional needs along with trying to create classes balanced by gender and size. It's not an easy or quick process and there are many drafts before landing on the final class lists. If you have a request you would like considered, please email carolyn.crowther@education.vic.gov.au by Friday 31st October 2025.

Submitting a request does not guarantee that it will be able to be met. Please note, that with the exception of Foundation, we do not know which teachers will be teaching in which year level yet and requests for teachers will be unable to be considered.

Key Transition Dates & Details

Foundation 2026 Transition Program: Five sessions, starting Friday 17th October (all dates listed on page 10).

October: Students and staff will reflect on the strengths of Heathcote PS's transition program and identify areas that could be improved. (Family feedback was sought in Term 3 through the Parent/Guardian/Caregiver survey 'positive transition' questions).

Late October and November: Multiple opportunities for students to spend time with their 2026 cohort. These sessions will align with the Foundation transition session dates and times from Thursday 30th October.

Foundation—Grade 5 students will 'step up' into their 2026 year level for the morning and spend time with their new cohort (but not necessarily their 2026 grade). These experiences will provide an opportunity for students to get to know people who might be in their 2026 grade. Grade 6 students will spend the time completing their own transition program along with organising their graduation.

November: Students will be asked to nominate five friends they would like to have in their 2026 grade. Students will be guaranteed at least one person from their list (but not necessarily all five). Families will be invited to complete this list with their child/ren.

Monday 8th December: Students will find out their 2026 class and teacher/s.

Tuesday 9th December: All students will spend the day in their 2026 grade with their classmates and teacher/s. Grade 6 students (Year 7 in 2026) will attend a statewide transition at government secondary schools.



Water Quality Results Poster - year at a glance



- 3. Take advantage of relaxed moments to have important conversations

very parent wants their child to succeed in school, but challenges are a natural part of any student's educational journey. Whether it's academic difficulties, social issues, or behavioural concerns, knowing how to approach these problems can make a big difference. Here are some tips for parents on how to effectively support their children when school-related issues arise.

Ask the Right Ouestions

If your child has been in a big argument or fight with a friend, it's natural to want to jump in and

more than you talk,

However, instead of leading with questions like, "Who started it?" or "Was it Max again?" take a breath and approach the conflict with curiosity. Ask openended questions like, "Why do you think the conflict happened?" or "What could you have done differently?" Instead of immediately trying to resolve the issue, ask, "How are you going to work this out?"

This encourages your child to think critically and take responsibility for

Talk Less, Listen More

As parents, we often feel the need to do all the talking when conflict arises, trying to fix the situation for our children. This can lead to jumping to conclusions and overshadowing the issue.

Instead, ask one of the open-ended questions above and then count slowly to eight seconds. This pause creates a space for your child to

> share their perspective. Often, they just want to talk it through, not necessarily ask you to step in and solve the problem.

The Car Ride

Have you noticed that children often open up more when they are in the car, on a walk, or while kicking a ball around?


One reason for this is the lack of direct, interrogative eye contact, which can be intimidating. These situations provide a more

relaxed environment, making it easier for your child to talk through issues. Use these opportunities to have meaningful conversations without the pressure of sitting face-to-face.

Conclusion

Navigating school challenges can be tough, but with the right approach, you can help your child overcome obstacles and thrive. Stay curious, listen more than you talk, and take advantage of relaxed moments to have important conversations. By fostering a supportive and proactive environment, you're setting your child up for success not just in school, but in life.





If you think you may be eligible, please contact the school office.


DRINK BOTTLE
