


Newsletter article: Bushfire At Risk Register - Schools

School procedures for the bushfire season

Fire danger ratings and warnings are used in Victoria to provide clear direction on the safest options for preserving life.

Schools and children's services listed on the DET Bushfire At-Risk Register (BARR) will be closed when a Code Red fire danger rating day is determined in their Bureau of Meteorology district. Our school has been identified as being one of those at high bushfire risk and is listed on the BARR.



FIRE DANGER RATING

Where possible, we will provide parents with up to four days notice of a potential Code Red day closure by letter and/or email. A Code Red day will be determined by the Emergency Management Commissioner no later than 1.00 pm the day before the potential closure. Once we are advised of the confirmation of the Code Red day we will provide you with advice before the end of the school day.

Once confirmed, the decision to close will not change, regardless of improvements in the weather forecast. This is to avoid confusion and help your family plan alternative care arrangements for your child. It is also important to note that:

- No staff will be on site on days where the school is closed due to a forecast Code Red day.
- School camps will be cancelled if a Code Red fire danger rating day is determined for the Bureau of Meteorology district in which the camp is located.
- As a bus co-ordinating school all bus routes will be cancelled.

Depending on which Bureau of Meteorology district is impacted bus route cancellations may affect our school.

On these Code Red days families are encouraged to enact their Bushfire Survival Plan – on such days children should never be left at home or in the care of older children.

• For those of us living in a bushfire prone area, the Country Fire Authority (CFA) advises that when Code Red days are forecast, the safest option is to leave the night before or early on the morning of the Code Red day. As part of preparing our school for potential hazards such as fire, we have updated and completed our Emergency Management Plan.



What can parents do?

Make sure your family's bushfire survival plan is up-to-date and includes alternative care arrangements in the event that our school is closed.

• Ensure we have your current contact details, including your mobile phone numbers. Keep in touch with us by reading our newsletters, if you have any questions do not hesitate to contact the school.

Most importantly at this time of year, if you're planning a holiday or short stay in the bush or in a coastal area, you should check warnings in advance of travel and remain vigilant during your stay.

If your child is old enough, talk to them about bushfires and your family's bushfire survival plan.





IN THE CLASSROOM


This week in the F/1 Room..

In English our word of the week is KITE; we will be focussing on the split graph i_e ('e' is changing the sound of the 'i'). We will even be making our own kites and trying to fly them. We will be reading and writing explanation texts such as 'why giraffes have blue tongues'.... Do you know why?

In Maths we will be revising and extending our knowledge of multiplication. We will be learning how to solve simple equations using written strategies (drawing groups) as well as basic mental strategies (skip counting).

In Inquiry we have a new focus.... 'Celebrations around the world'. We will begin by looking at what we celebrate here in Australia and more specifically what and how the students celebrate at home.







This week in the Grade 2 Room...

Welcome to week 8! This week the students will continue their investigations in reading, finding new information from our shared texts, and linking their current knowledge on a topic to newly developed understandings.

In writing, the students will begin to work on a partnered narrative. This will involve the students working with 2-3 people to brainstorm, plan, develop and publish their writing. Once their writing is published, the students will have the opportunity to create a visual representation of their story using animation software.

Finally, in maths this week, the students will explore multiplication, focusing on arrays, groups of, and repeated addition.






IN THE CLASSROOM


This week in the Grade 3/4 Room...

We are very excited to be finishing our literary text of Coraline this week. The class will have the opportunity to watch Tim Burtons' movie adaption and make comparisons between events, characters, setting and the themes that take place between the book and film. Journal writing will be our new text type for the following fortnight as we respond to questions and think about our feelings in regards to events (real and imagined).

The Numeracy focus for this week will be division. We will build on multiplication skills that have been developed over the past two weeks and make links between the two operations.







This week in the Grade 4/5 Room

The Grade 4/5 students have been working hard this week. As part of our reading we have been looking at Aesop's Fables and talking about the author's purpose and genre. Students identified the moral of each story, and we discussed how these morals apply to situations within our own lives.

We have also begun working on our narratives in writing. We have discussed the important components of narrative writing, and planned our writing pieces to follow this structure. The students have come up with lists of interesting words to be used in place of the words "said", and "walked". Our aim is to increase our use of descriptive language in order to engage the reader.

In mathematics we have begun our topic of "Time". We have looked at many different aspects of time including analogue and digital clocks, timelines, timetables, and months of the year. The students have been practising singing a catchy song to help them to remember how many days are in each month.

This week in the Grade 5/6 Room...


This week, reading will be assessed. We are looking forward to seeing growth in all students. It was exciting to assess writing last week. Everyone was very enthusiastic to demonstrate all the skills they've been focusing on this semester.

Students are very excited to be revisiting debating this week. We will be refining our skills in delivering a debate in groups. We will be engaged in working in a team to research, write, deliver and rebut a specific argument in a formal setting.

Everyone is enjoying Measurement in mathematics. Last week saw us learning the difference between mass and weight. This week we will be focusing on the difference between volume and capacity. Students will be engaged in some hands-on activities to consolidate their understandings in this area.
