Principal's Report

With the half way point of Term 4 behind us, our attention is both on finishing the 2025 school year strongly and preparing for a smooth transition into 2026. Please see information on page 12 about opportunities for families to support the transition program.

The school value of learning is demonstrated by students across curriculum areas. An enthusiastic artist recently shared his work with me. Not only did I admire the artwork itself, I also enjoyed hearing about how hard he had worked as he enthusiastically described how he combined features of multiple animals to create the finished product. I've also recently enjoyed reading student writing, including a recount about the adventures of a dog.



There was much excitement in the sandpit this week as a team of Grade 1/2 students worked tirelessly to build volcanoes. What began as a play time sculpture ended up with a class experiment and multiple volcanic eruptions on Friday afternoon! It was wonderful to see the commitment and initiative of students—they organised their own equipment, worked through setbacks and enjoyed seeing their hard work erupt. There were squeals of excitement as the volcanoes sprayed 'lava' high into the air...even onto Miss John!

Earlier in the year, Foundation students learnt about their local community and now they are 'travelling' further afield. Latest stop: Antarctica! Much fun was had completing an experiment to make snow and 'snow sand', described by a young explorer as "being the same colour as smashed potato!" and the snow as "being so, so soft!" With the lovely warm weather, classes are making the most of opportunities to learn outside.

School Wide Positive Behaviour Support

AIP Goal 2: To improve student engagement and wellbeing outcomes Action: Introduce School Wide Positive Behaviour Support program

Our expected behaviours matrix is displayed in all learning areas and the main office. Our values cards are earned by students when they demonstrate expected behaviours. Student leaders collect and count the values cards each week at their leadership meeting and all values cards earned in the week are placed in a



tub with two winners randomly drawn out at assembly, earning themselves a 'values voucher'.



Expected behaviour: We place rubbish in the correct bin

Each classroom has a recycling tub that is emptied into the bins with yellow lids. On Friday afternoons, monitors from each class empty the classroom tubs into the outside bins ready for 'bin night' on Monday.

> The bins with red lids are for non-recyclable rubbish items.

Preparing for 2026—Key Transition Dates

Foundation 2026 Transition Program:

Five sessions, starting Friday 17th October (all dates listed on page 11).

Early October:

• Students and staff reflect on the strengths of Heathcote PS's transition program and identify areas that could be improved. (Family feedback was sought in Term 3 through the Parent/Guardian/Caregiver survey 'positive transition' questions).

Late October and November:

- Multiple opportunities for students to spend time with their 2026 cohort. These sessions
 will align with the 2026 Foundation transition session dates and times from Thursday 30th
 October onwards.
- Foundation—Grade 5 students 'step up' into their 2026 year level for the morning and spend time with their new cohort (but not necessarily in their 2026 grade). These experiences provide an opportunity for students to get to know people who might be in their 2026 grade and work with different teachers. Grade 6 students spend the time completing their own transition program along with organising their graduation.

November:

- Students asked to nominate five friends they would like to have in their 2026 grade. Students will be guaranteed at least one person from their list (but not necessarily all five). Families invited to complete this list with their child/ren. **DUE: 21/11/25**
- Families invited to complete a 'Get to Know....' one page profile about their child/ren.

 These will be shared with 2026 classroom teachers before the statewide Transition Day on 9th December. **DUE: 21/11/25**
- Share transition information (both within HPS and between primary and secondary schools, kindergartens and HPS)

December:

- Monday 8th December: Students find out their 2026 class and teacher/s.
- Tuesday 9th December: All students spend the day in their 2026 grade with their classmates and teacher/s. Grade 6 students (Year 7 in 2026) attend a statewide transition day at government secondary schools.

Families are invited to please complete the 'Get to Know....' student profile and return to school by Friday 21st November.




Yard Supervision

The school yard is supervised from 8:45am until 9am. There is an announcement at 8:45am to signal classroom doors are open. Students are able to put their bags in their room, complete any before school routines and monitor jobs before heading back outside to play. Newsletter and website article: Schools in Category 3 on the Bushfire At-Risk Register and the Category 4 List

This article has been developed by the Department of Education for schools to publish in their newsletter and school website.

This information has been developed to answer frequently asked questions regarding the Bushfire At-Risk Register (BARR) and Category 4 list and our school's closure on a Catastrophic fire danger day in your fire weather district.

School preparations for the bushfire season

Each year, we undertake a range of activities to ensure the safety of our school and to prepare for bushfires and grassfires.

An important part of this process is communicating to parents what will happen when certain fire danger ratings are issued to help ensure the safety of students and staff.



Our school has been identified as being at risk of bushfire or grassfire and is a Category 3 school.

Our school will **close** on a day forecasted as **Catastrophic fire danger rating** in **Northern Country fire district.**

Closure of the school due to a Catastrophic fire danger rating will be enacted when the Bureau of Meteorology forecast and related public safety messaging are confirmed. Due to uncertainties in the forecast, the timing of this confirmation may vary. Information regarding potential or confirmed Catastrophic fire danger days will be communicated to you by **Compass and post on the school's private Facebook group.**

It is also important to be aware that:

- No one will be on site on days where the school is closed due to a forecast Catastrophic day.
- All bus routes that travel through the Catastrophic area will be cancelled.
- School camps will be cancelled if a Catastrophic fire danger rating day is forecast for fire
 weather district in which the camp is located, or if the travel involves passing through areas
 that have Catastrophic fire danger.

As part of preparing our school for the fire season, we have updated and completed our Emergency Management Plan which includes an identified 'Shelter in Place' location if needed. We have also continued to maintain the school grounds to reduce the fuel load.

What can families and the school community do to help us prepare?

Ensure we have your current contact details, including your mobile phone numbers.



- Keep in touch with us by reading our newsletters, checking our <u>website</u>, by talking to your child's teacher or any other member of the teaching staff about our emergency management plan.
- Make sure your family's bushfire survival plan is up-to-date and includes alternative care arrangements if our school is closed due to Catastrophic fire danger. Further information can be found on the <u>CFA's website</u>.
- Action your family's bushfire survival plan if your own triggers are met. Our school community
 may be spread out across many areas and some families may be at higher risk than others.
 Your family's safety is critical, so please let us know if you are actioning your bushfire survival
 plan and if your children will be absent on these days.
- If your child is old enough, talk to them about bushfires and your family's bushfire survival plan.

Families are encouraged to action their <u>Bushfire Survival Plan</u> on Catastrophic fire danger rating days in their district. The safest option is to leave the night before or early on the morning of the Catastrophic day. **On such days, children should never be left at home alone or in the care of older children.**

Frequently Asked Questions

What is the department's policy?

The Department of Education annually assesses the fire risk of all schools and early childhood services with the support of the Commonwealth Scientific and Industrial Research Organisation (CSIRO). They are allocated a category of risk (categories 0 to 6). Schools and services that are Categories 0-3 are published on the Bushfire At-Risk Register (BARR). Schools at some risk of bushfire and grassfire are published on the Category 4 List.

The department's <u>Bushfire and Grassfire Preparedness Policy</u> requires all schools and early childhood services on the BARR and the Category 4 List to close when a Catastrophic fire danger rating day is forecast in their fire weather district. All school bus routes which travel in or through a district with Catastrophic fire danger must also be cancelled.

The policy also requires that schools at the highest risk of bushfire (those in Categories 0, 1 and 2 of the Bushfire At-Risk Register) enact pre-emptive action plans based on the fire danger forecast for their Local Government Area (LGA).

Who issues fire danger forecasts?

The Bureau of Meteorology (BoM) provides public fire danger rating forecasts each day of the fire danger period using fire weather district areas. In Victoria, there are 9 fire weather districts, which are based on Local Government Area boundaries.

The department uses these forecasts when supporting schools to enact their pre-emptive bushfire actions plans.

Protecting against mosquito-borne diseases

Warm and wet weather can result in greater numbers of mosquitoes and an increased risk of illness from mosquito bites. While the overall risk is currently low, some mosquitoes may be carrying diseases that make people sick.

The best protection against mosquito-borne illness is to avoid mosquito bites.

Families can protect against mosquito bites by:

- covering up as much as possible with long, loose-fitting, light-coloured clothing
- applying insect repellent that contains picaridin or DEET on exposed skin when outdoors
- limiting outdoor activity if lots of mosquitoes are active
- clean up and remove containers and items around the home that may hold water where mosquitoes may breed.

Free Japanese encephalitis vaccines

Japanese encephalitis virus is spread to humans through bites from infected mosquitoes and can cause a rare but potentially serious infection of the brain.

A free vaccine is available to some individuals to protect Victorians at higher risk of the virus.



If you think you may be eligible, please contact the school office.


