
The Zooper Dooper fundraiser is proving to be a very popular one. So popular, that we have raised approximately \$300 in one week!




### **Learning—Mandalay Resources Visit**



On Thursday, Natasha, Stevie and Braden from the Costerfield Gold Mine visited the school. Natasha is the community office and introduced us to Stevie and Braden and why they were visiting. Stevie told us about her job as a mining engineer and explained that she is basically a Minecraft character but in real life. They use explosives to break the rocks and special equipment to dig. We watched two different explosions happen on the screen and everyone thought it was really satisfying to watch. Braden explained that he is a geologist and he uses a magnifying glass to look for the gold in rocks to help figure out where they need to dig. He told us that they mine for antinomy as well as gold and explained that antinomy is used to make computer chips. Braden showed us his pick axe and told us that the flat end is for hitting rocks and the pointy end is for digging dirt. He showed us some rocks that had gold ore in them and let us have a closer look by passing two around. He also talked about fossils and what kind of things can turn into fossils. He even showed us some fossil poo! It was disgusting. The grade 1/2s and their teachers really enjoyed the presentation and learned a lot. Zali, our Auslan teacher, came in at the end and taught the whole group some signs related to mining. It was all pretty cool!

### Learning—Mandalay Resources Visit





Natasha, Mandalay Resources' Community Officer, brought her two special friends, Stevie and Braden, to Heathcote Primary School. They work at the Costerfield Mines. They are known as a gold mine and they also mine antinomy which is used for making gold and computer chips for phones, play stations, iPads and computers. Pretty much all devices have antinomy.

Stevie is basically Minecraft in real life! She digs through caves and puts explosives in then explodes things so it it's easier and it breaks up the rocks so they can dig it up and find gold. A machine digs up the dirt then they put it in a dump truck and take it back to base so they can look for gold. Everyone mines around the clock at all times.

Braden's job is a geologist and breaks down rocks so Stevie and her team can do their job. He brought in rocks with gold, and he also tells people where to mine and where the gold may be found.




tub with two winners randomly drawn out at assembly, earning themselves a 'values voucher'.

### Preparing for 2026—Key Transition Dates

### Foundation 2026 Transition Program:

Five sessions, starting Friday 17th October (all dates listed on page 11).

### Early October:

• Students and staff reflect on the strengths of Heathcote PS's transition program and identify areas that could be improved. (Family feedback was sought in Term 3 through the Parent/Guardian/Caregiver survey 'positive transition' questions).

### Late October and November:

- Multiple opportunities for students to spend time with their 2026 cohort. These sessions
  will align with the 2026 Foundation transition session dates and times from Thursday 30th
  October onwards.
- Foundation—Grade 5 students 'step up' into their 2026 year level for the morning and spend time with their new cohort (but not necessarily in their 2026 grade). These experiences provide an opportunity for students to get to know people who might be in their 2026 grade and work with different teachers. Grade 6 students spend the time completing their own transition program along with organising their graduation.

#### November:

- Students asked to nominate five friends they would like to have in their 2026 grade. Students will be guaranteed at least one person from their list (but not necessarily all five). Families invited to complete this list with their child/ren. DUE: 21/11/25
- Families invited to complete a 'Get to Know....' one page profile about their child/ren.

  These will be shared with 2026 classroom teachers before the statewide Transition Day on 9th December. DUE: 21/11/25
- Share transition information (both within HPS and between primary and secondary schools, kindergartens and HPS)

### December:

- Monday 8th December: Students find out their 2026 class and teacher/s.
- Tuesday 9th December: All students spend the day in their 2026 grade with their classmates and teacher/s. Grade 6 students (Year 7 in 2026) attend a statewide transition day at government secondary schools.


An electronic copy will be shared via Compass. Please use whichever version suits you best. For any copies completed electronically, please email to carolyn.crowther@education.vic.gov.au


### Yard Supervision

# Newsletter and website article: Schools in Category 3 on the Bushfire At-Risk Register and the Category 4 List

This article has been developed by the Department of Education for schools to publish in their newsletter and school website.

This information has been developed to answer frequently asked questions regarding the Bushfire At-Risk Register (BARR) and Category 4 list and our school's closure on a Catastrophic fire danger day in your fire weather district.

### School preparations for the bushfire season

Each year, we undertake a range of activities to ensure the safety of our school and to prepare for bushfires and grassfires.

An important part of this process is communicating to parents what will happen when certain fire danger ratings are issued to help ensure the safety of students and staff.



Our school has been identified as being at risk of bushfire or grassfire and is a Category 3 school.

Our school will **close** on a day forecasted as **Catastrophic fire danger rating** in **Northern Country fire district**.

Closure of the school due to a Catastrophic fire danger rating will be enacted when the Bureau of Meteorology forecast and related public safety messaging are confirmed. Due to uncertainties in the forecast, the timing of this confirmation may vary. Information regarding potential or confirmed Catastrophic fire danger days will be communicated to you by Compass and post on the school's private Facebook group.

It is also important to be aware that:

- No one will be on site on days where the school is closed due to a forecast Catastrophic day.
- All bus routes that travel through the Catastrophic area will be cancelled.
- School camps will be cancelled if a Catastrophic fire danger rating day is forecast for fire
  weather district in which the camp is located, or if the travel involves passing through areas
  that have Catastrophic fire danger.

As part of preparing our school for the fire season, we have updated and completed our Emergency Management Plan which includes an identified 'Shelter in Place' location if needed. We have also continued to maintain the school grounds to reduce the fuel load.

### What can families and the school community do to help us prepare?

Ensure we have your current contact details, including your mobile phone numbers.



- Keep in touch with us by reading our newsletters, checking our <u>website</u>, by talking to your child's teacher or any other member of the teaching staff about our emergency management plan.
- Make sure your family's bushfire survival plan is up-to-date and includes alternative care arrangements if our school is closed due to Catastrophic fire danger. Further information can be found on the CFA's website.
- Action your family's bushfire survival plan if your own triggers are met. Our school community
  may be spread out across many areas and some families may be at higher risk than others.
  Your family's safety is critical, so please let us know if you are actioning your bushfire survival
  plan and if your children will be absent on these days.
- If your child is old enough, talk to them about bushfires and your family's bushfire survival plan.

Families are encouraged to action their <u>Bushfire Survival Plan</u> on Catastrophic fire danger rating days in their district. The safest option is to leave the night before or early on the morning of the Catastrophic day. **On such days, children should never be left at home alone or in the care of older children.**

#### Frequently Asked Questions

### What is the department's policy?

The Department of Education annually assesses the fire risk of all schools and early childhood services with the support of the Commonwealth Scientific and Industrial Research Organisation (CSIRO). They are allocated a category of risk (categories 0 to 6). Schools and services that are Categories 0-3 are published on the <a href="Bushfire At-Risk Register (BARR)">Bushfire At-Risk Register (BARR)</a>. Schools at some risk of bushfire and grassfire are published on the <a href="Category 4 List">Category 4 List</a>.

The department's <u>Bushfire and Grassfire Preparedness Policy</u> requires all schools and early childhood services on the BARR and the Category 4 List to close when a Catastrophic fire danger rating day is forecast in their fire weather district. All school bus routes which travel in or through a district with Catastrophic fire danger must also be cancelled.

The policy also requires that schools at the highest risk of bushfire (those in Categories 0, 1 and 2 of the Bushfire At-Risk Register) enact pre-emptive action plans based on the fire danger forecast for their Local Government Area (LGA).

### Who issues fire danger forecasts?

The Bureau of Meteorology (BoM) provides public fire danger rating forecasts each day of the fire danger period using fire weather district areas. In Victoria, there are 9 fire weather districts, which are based on Local Government Area boundaries.

The department uses these forecasts when supporting schools to enact their pre-emptive bushfire actions plans.

## From the Department of Education

### **Craft Sand Recall**

You may have heard about the recent recall of craft sand products that may contain asbestos.

<u>National and Victorian health authorities</u> have advised that the possible risk to human health from these products has been downgraded from low to very low.

We have followed advice provided by the Department of Education. We have not located any products at Heathcote Primary School. If we do, we will take the steps set out by the Department of Education to safely collect and store the product, and to arrange for safe disposal. This may involve qualified people attending our school to clean and collect waste.

If you have the product at home, please follow advice from the health authorities.

### Personal Property Reminder

Heathcote Primary School understands that staff and/or students may sometimes like to bring items of personal property to school.

Heathcote Primary School does not take responsibility for items of personal property that are lost, stolen or damaged at school or during school activities. Damage to personal property brought to school is the responsibility of the owner of that property.

Heathcote Primary School encourages staff and students not to bring items of value to school, or to obtain appropriate insurance for such items.

## From the Department of Education

### Protecting against mosquito-borne diseases

Warm and wet weather can result in greater numbers of mosquitoes and an increased risk of illness from mosquito bites. While the overall risk is currently low, some mosquitoes may be carrying diseases that make people sick.

The best protection against mosquito-borne illness is to avoid mosquito bites.

Families can protect against mosquito bites by:

- covering up as much as possible with long, loose-fitting, light-coloured clothing
- applying insect repellent that contains picaridin or DEET on exposed skin when outdoors
- limiting outdoor activity if lots of mosquitoes are active
- clean up and remove containers and items around the home that may hold water where mosquitoes may breed.

Families with any health concerns should see their doctor or phone NURSE-ON-CALL: 1300 606 024 (available 24 hours).

### Free Japanese encephalitis vaccines

Japanese encephalitis virus is spread to humans through bites from infected mosquitoes and can cause a rare but potentially serious infection of the brain.

A free vaccine is available to some individuals to protect Victorians at higher risk of the virus.





If you think you may be eligible, please contact the school office.


